
A/C CLEANING

Each year the Association has new mulch applied to all our landscape beds. This new mulch is susceptible to being sucked into your external air conditioning cooling unit and may lodge itself on the outside of the cooling fins. Usually, the mulch is applied early in the year before your need for the A/C to be on. But some residents may be affected. MMM is instructed to clean any new mulch from the pad that the A/C unit sits on to help eliminate this from happening. Any buildup is visible, so if you have any, just spray a hose on the outside near the top, letting the water drain down the coils. Remove any resultant debris from the pad.

As a general rule, it is good to hose your unit down periodically or better yet, apply a coil cleaner, available at most hardware stores. If you have a maintenance contract for your HVAC equipment, you should be sure the contractor performs this cleaning. Your A/C will operate more efficiently, and you may enjoy a smaller electric bill.


2023 Asphalt Activity – Seal Coat for the 2022 driveway new asphalt – The Board approved the expenditure of \$2,878.04 from the Reserve Fund for the seal coat to be performed by Todd's Asphalt. Todd usually does this work in July or August. We have offered any other resident the opportunity to have their driveway sealed at their expense at the same time. To date, we have not received any requests for this year.

2023 Asphalt Activity – We performed the annual driveway inspection in mid-March. There were 7 driveways that require action this year. Quotes were obtained. Funding was determined by the Finance Committee and our joint recommendation was given to the Board for their consideration. The Board approved the expenditure of \$129,342 from the Reserve Fund of which \$126,842 is for the asphalt work to be performed by Tarbuck Paving and \$2,500 is for the backfill landscape to be performed by Mow, Mulch & More. The asphalt work includes the repair of the Entry interface with Main Street to eliminate the persistent pothole problems there and the interface with the stamped concrete "bridge" in the Entry to bring this to level. The asphalt work for the driveways involves the full replacement of the driveways serving 117/121 FMD, 159/163/165/169 GAC, 204/206 GAC, 307/313 MCL, and 315/317 MCL, and the replacement of the remainder of 157/161 GAC and 329 MCL. This activity is expected to begin in late August.

Storage Facility Project Final Update – The Board requested that Buildings & Roads investigate for use by all Committees the purchase of a storage facility.

Previously reported: The recommendation to the Board was as follows: Acquire an 8' X 10' vinyl storage facility from Wayfair to be placed in the far-left hand corner of the Swimming Pool area abutting the retaining wall. We will assemble this storage facility. The cost of this storage facility, shipped to our site, is \$1,747.93. The Board approved the recommendation.

Update: The storage facility was purchased by Jim Hazi for \$1,493.69. It was delivered on May 1. Due to inclement weather, we were unable to begin constructing the shed until May 5. Construction took an afternoon on Friday and an afternoon on Saturday. Jim, Ron Richards, Rick Hergert, Bob Romain, and George Cenkovich volunteered their time. The front corner of the shed next to the retaining wall required leveling material which Jim applied. Jim & Bob moved all the intended attic contents to the shed, mostly Social Committee & Clubhouse containers. Grounds added their tools & stuff. The Winter Pool cover was stored until Fall. All with room to spare. Well done all!

Sidewalk Crack Repair & Overlay Project – Determine coating material and plan to overlay cracked stoops. As a part of the 2022 sidewalk safety inspection conducted in September of last year, we noted for follow-up the stoops that had cracks. Phase I inspection identified 26 locations out of the 88 sidewalks with this condition. Phase II inspection identified 15 locations out of the 36 sidewalks with this condition. What is a stoop? It is the cement pad directly in front of your entry door. We planned to offer residents with the cracked stoops an opportunity to have this unsightly condition corrected at your expense, on a voluntary basis. We have had numerous requests for a solution to this cracking.

Update: In the next couple of weeks, the affected locations will receive an email with the approximate cost to overlay your stoop, for your review and final indication of interest to proceed. We will recap the locations and determine a schedule from the contractor.

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Judi Ickes Receiving an Award

Judi Ickes didn't know it at the time, but 10 years ago, when a tutor for the Literacy Council of Southwestern Pennsylvania asked if she could use a room in First Presbyterian Church 1793 to teach an ESL (English as a Second Language) student, Ickes, a retired Spanish and home economics teacher, would find a new purpose. Ickes wasn't familiar with the literacy council, but the tutor mentioned there was an upcoming tutor training class. So, two weeks later, Ickes and a few others attended.

While Ickes was there, recalled Kris Drach, a tutor and literacy council board president, three Latina women knocked on the door to inquire about classes. Drach asked if any of the tutors spoke Spanish, and Ickes raised her hand. "The rest is history," said Ickes, who was honored with a 10-year Tutor Service Award during a May 10 recognition ceremony at the literacy council's headquarters in Washington.

For Ickes, who currently teaches three ESL classes a week, tutoring immigrants was a perfect fit. Over the past decade, Ickes has taught all levels of ESL, and she respects the courage and dedication of students committed to improving their literacy skills.

"But it's much more than just helping them improve their literacy skills. We take them for driver's tests, go to doctor's visits, help them fill out forms whenever they need a little extra help," she said. "Once you get the students, you help them whenever you can. (Knowing the language) helps the students be brave enough to go out into society, get a job, be a part of their community." Ickes said she and her fellow tutors find satisfaction in their students' achievements. One former student, who now lives in Arizona and keeps in frequent touch with Ickes, told her that she and a friend who was visiting from Venezuela drove to visit her brother in New England and stopped in New York City for a few days of sightseeing.

"She was so proud of herself for being able to get around and to use her English, and I was so proud of her," said Ickes. "We're just so proud of all of their achievements, especially the women who take classes. We empower women, and that's really important. Tutoring really is so meaningful. We just fall in love with our students, and that's why we keep doing it."
